



Have you been thinking that maybe you might like to be more involved with the mission at Faith Lutheran Church, but aren't quite certain what you would like to do or where to begin? Have you perhaps had little desire to serve the church but thought that maybe you ought

to have a hand in the work that goes on around your congregation? There is no time like the present to jump in with both feet. There are things old and new to be done.

There is a growing need for transportation to and from church. With some of our congregation getting on in age, there are several folks that would regularly attend if they had a means to come. There have been a few very helpful souls around to help, but there are often more people needing rides than there are rides to bring them. We have opportunities to serve our long faithful members, and for some evangelism as well.

We are also about to begin recording sermons and taking them to shut-ins on mp-3 players. There will be a need for some individuals to help take them out to shut-ins, and retrieve them later to be re-recorded. Establishing this work will be imperative to the care of our shut-ins, who often haven't heard a service or a sermon in quite some time, or for those who sensibly stay home when winter weather gets too dangerous.

There is a growing need for people to clean the church on a weekly basis. A few diligent souls have been holding up the duties for quite some time, and it really is time for some more hands to help with the work required. We have gotten some quotes from cleaning services regarding cleaning the church on a regular basis, and I assure you that it isn't cheap. It seems like with just a bit more involvement from a number of people, these are things we could continue to do in house, so that our offerings can continue to pay down the debt, and support the mission here at Faith.

Both I and the Board of Deacons understand that everyone is at different stages in life, and adding more to the daily schedule is sometimes just not possible. Sometimes the vocations we have to deal with in a day take priority over the work of the church. But if you have read this message and recognize that you might have a moment to play some small part in the work of this congregation (namely, proclaiming Christ crucified for the forgiveness of sins), then please contact Pastor Killian, Jeff Elbert, or your deacon, and

see what needs to be done. Many hands make light work, and there is plenty to do.

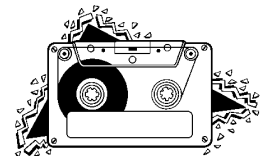

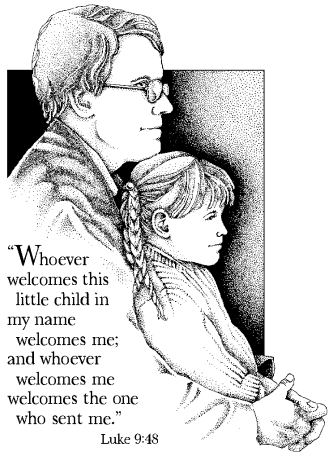

CHILDREN IN WORSHIP

We know children can be a handful in a worship service. We believe God wants your children to be part of the worship time and so do we.



“Whoever welcomes this little child in my name welcomes me; and whoever welcomes me welcomes the one who sent me.”

Luke 9:48

You can begin training them as soon as they can sit by themselves. To help you, here are some suggestions. First - Worship with them, teaching them the pattern of worship. Folding hands during prayers is a good place to begin and standing when the congregation does. As they get older teach them to follow the service in the hymnal or with a large print bulletin. Teach them the hymns so they can sing with you. During the sermon, let them color or play quietly.

And finally – they are children and will not be perfect. We expect an occasional “melt down” so hang in there. There is a cry room where you can sit and listen to the service till your child calms down. You can take your bulletin with you and follow along and you can even see the service through the large window looking in to the sanctuary.

ISLAM AND OUTREACH

The IDE Lutheran Laymen's League sponsored a speaker from People of the Book Lutheran Outreach (POBLO) on March 12 in Cedar Rapids. The guest speaker, Cynthia Mehdi Khan, and her husband were born and raised in the Middle East and have first-hand experience interacting with Muslims and people from other Eastern religions. The goal of POBLO is to give Muslims a chance to hear the Good News for the very first time. POBLO is culturally relevant; all their missionaries are from Islamic countries. They have been through the culture shock of moving to this country from one very different. They serve immigrants and refugees and train and educate churches on how to engage in cross-cultural outreach.

They have a hotline for counseling parents whose children are dating a Muslim or talking of converting to Islam. This is happening more and more. The goal is educating and equipping youth, high school and confirmation age, to understand Islam so they won't be deceived. Apologetics is very important in preparing youth to answer questions from Muslims.

We were encouraged to have conversations with Muslims that we may know or meet in public. A simple question, "May I know your name?" is a good opener. Do NOT ask if they speak English.

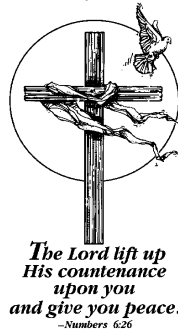

History and the Early Church's Doctrine

From the White Horse Inn

From the beginning, the Christian gospel, as indeed the name "gospel" or "good news" implies, consisted in an account of something that had happened. And from the beginning, the meaning of the happening was set forth; and when the meaning of the happening was set forth, then there was Christian doctrine. "Christ died"-that is history; "Christ died for our sins"-that is doctrine. Without these two elements, joined in an absolutely indissoluble union, there is no Christianity.

It is perfectly clear, then, that the first Christian missionaries did not simply come forward with an exhortation; they did not say: "Jesus of Nazareth lived a wonderful life of filial piety, and we call upon you our hearers to yield yourselves, as we have done, to the spell of that life." Certainly that is what modern historians would have expected the first Christian missionaries to say, but it must be recognized that as a matter of fact they said nothing of the kind.

Below is what was posted on the website from LFE.

•In the past few years participation in Labels for Education® has declined and as a result, Campbell has come to the very difficult decision to wind down the LFE program. The good news is nothing changes this program year. There will be changes for next year's program starting August 1, 2016.
